

THE PRIMATE'S WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND (PWRDF) by Basil Pogue Secretary, PWRDF Board of Directors

PWRDF has its roots in a humanitarian disaster in Nova Scotia in 1958. The Ukraine has been on our minds this year when another disaster unfolded along with displaced people and refugees fleeing war. Charities invited support and, so far, over \$800,000 has been contributed through PWRDF alone.

In 2022, PWRDF's work is much larger than disaster relief and resettlement of refugees. Responding to disasters is not our sole raison d'être. Development now forms a larger piece focused on the third world and on work with Canadian indigenous communities. This is partly where reconciliation becomes real, where we can be seen to be committed to alleviating the legacy of residential schools.

PWRDF works with displaced parties in many countries: with the Humanitarian Coalition to alleviate famine and hunger in 14 countries of sub-Saharan Africa; with the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, based in Winnipeg, to feed the hungry; and through Action by Churches Together (ACT) to disburse the funds donated for Ukraine. We are channeling funds through Hungarian aid organizations, as we have no footprint in Ukraine. Unlike other charities, PWRDF does not put boots on the ground. We form partnerships, believing that local people know much better how to do things than so-called experts from abroad. PWRDF is a healthy living organization which all Anglicans should know about and be proud to support. With an annual budget of \$10 million, it continues to be one of the Anglican Church of Canada's success stories in striving to create a truly just, healthy and peaceful world.
